From the Committee

It has been a while since our last Newsletter and Committee meeting, but summer is coming and we would like to encourage you to diarise the dates in the sailing calendar and join other Woollacott boats on the water. This Newsletter talks about the preservation of Woollacott boats and we would like to encourage you to voice your suggestions. We are hosting a gathering for Woollacott members at the Devonport Yacht Club on Thursday, 17 November (more details below), please come and join us for this event.

Securing, protecting, and restoring Woollacott Boats

A number of Woollacott boats come on the market from time to time, some find a home, others are not quite so lucky. Most boats we have seen are very solid and sound considering the age of them. However, we are also aware that the real cost lies with the storage and maintenance of these boats, and of course having people that will take care of them and actually use them. We have been kicking some thoughts around and would be interested in your views on this matter and how best we, as an Association, should address this issue.

We have a vision as to the end use of the saved and maintained boats which can be expanded and built on:

- Since Woollacott boats are generally smaller we feel they are well suited for taking senior high school children (or public groups) on trips (similar to the Sprit of New Zealand) with say 5 berths, one would be taken by a qualified skipper, one could be a parent/teacher, and three students.
- If we aim to have a fleet of say 5 to 10 serviceable boats for each trip, this would give a group size of between 25 and 50 people. Education would revolve around leadership, environment (ocean, coastline, sea creatures etc - tapping into existing organisations such as that running the marine centre at Goat Island), history, planning, and project management skills during a 5 day programme.
- At the end of each year we could have a race between participating schools (one school crew for each boat and a competition to be the chosen school) - the race being one of the existing CYA or DYC races - staying overnight and mixing with all other crews.
- Part of the programme with the schools could involve a maintenance schedule throughout the year (hence developing project management and practical skills).

While Woollacott Boats are not fast racing machines, they are safe and dependable with whatever can be thrown at them, hence making them a safe classroom. Also on the work side, it would not matter so much that the workmanship was not totally a 100% (so long as the structural side was).

To achieve this we see that several steps would need to be taken:

- Set up some form of formal structure with which we can secure these boats, first thought is to create a Woollacott Charitable Trust, or maybe work closely with existing trusts such as the Classic Yacht Charitable Trust or Sprit of New Zealand in developing the above idea further. The aims and objectives would be very close to CYCT:
 - The preservation and maintenance of Woollacott boats (may include providing some assistance to owners of Woollacott boats)
 - o Educate young people and develop their skills to preserve and maintain boats
- Locate suitable storage location(s) to enable the boats to be stored until we have enough funding and the
 right structure in place to get the work done, accepting this may take a number of years.
- Obtain funds yes, the tough part
 - o Apply for funds through grants etc.
 - o Seek funds from businesses and anyone else.
- Manage the whole operation to ensure future generations see and use these old boats.

We have set quite a task if we go down this path and we are open to all suggestions on how we can save Woollacott boats from falling into more disrepair as time moves on.

Woollacott Association Constitution

This has been drafted and is currently in a holding pattern until we discuss and agree our direction as an association.

Sailing Events
